HEAT STRESS

COURSE DESCRIPTION:

This training session provides employees and supervisors with essential knowledge and practical strategies to recognize, prevent, and respond to heat-related illness in the workplace, in compliance with California's Heat Illness Prevention Standard (Title 8, Section 3395).

Participants will learn how heat stress affects the body, identify environmental and personal risk factors, and recognize early warning signs and symptoms of heat-related illnesses such as heat exhaustion and heat stroke. The course emphasizes the importance of proactive prevention measures, including proper hydration, access to shade, acclimatization, and work/rest cycles.

The training also covers employer and employee responsibilities under California regulations, including procedures for high-heat conditions, emergency response protocols, and effective communication strategies. Real-world scenarios and best practices are incorporated to ensure participants can apply the information in field settings. By the end of the session, attendees will be equipped to protect themselves and others, reduce the risk of heat-related incidents, and maintain a safe, compliant work environment during hot weather conditions.

Learning Objectives

By the end of this training, participants will be able to:

- **Identify key causes and risk factors** of heat stress, including environmental conditions and personal factors that increase susceptibility.
- **Recognize the signs and symptoms** of common heat-related illnesses such as heat cramps, heat exhaustion, and heat stroke.
- **Apply effective prevention strategies**, including proper hydration, use of shade, acclimatization practices, and appropriate work/rest cycles.
- **Explain roles and responsibilities** of both employers and employees under California's Heat Illness Prevention Standard (Title 8, Section 3395).
- **Demonstrate appropriate emergency response actions** when a heat-related illness is suspected, including reporting procedures and first aid steps.

Who should attend?

This training is recommended for all employees and supervisors who work in environments where exposure to heat may occur, including:

- **Outdoor workers**, such as those in construction, agriculture, landscaping, utilities, and transportation
- **Indoor workers** in high-heat environments without adequate climate control, such as warehouses, manufacturing facilities, kitchens, and maintenance operations
- **Frontline supervisors and crew leaders** responsible for monitoring employee safety and enforcing heat illness prevention procedures
- **Safety managers, HR personnel, and compliance staff** involved in implementing California heat illness prevention programs
- **New employees or employees returning to work** who may require acclimatization to hot working conditions

TRAFFIC CONTROL/FLAGGER TRAINING

COURSE DESCRIPTION:

This city-focused training course prepares municipal employees, contractors, and public works personnel to safely manage traffic flow in urban environments. Emphasizing compliance with local ordinances and state regulations, the course provides in class instruction in flagging operations and traffic control procedures essential for maintaining safety in city streets, intersections, and public works zones while encroaching onto the street.

KEY TOPICS COVERED:

- Traffic control fundamentals and regulations
- Reading and implementing municipal traffic control plans
- Safe flagging techniques in high-density and pedestrian-heavy areas
- Use of signage, barricades, and personal protective equipment (PPE)
- MUTCD compliance and local policy integration

LOCK OUT TAG OUT (Authorized User)

COURSE DESCRIPTION:

Purpose of Energy Control: Explaining why Lockout Tagout exists to prevent the unexpected startup or release of hazardous energy (electrical, mechanical, pneumatic, etc.).

Hazard Recognition: Identifying the specific machines in the area that undergo servicing and recognizing authorized Lockout Tagout devices (locks, tags, chains).

Roles & Limitations: Understanding that only authorized personnel can apply or remove locks. Affected employees must not attempt to service the machine themselves or remove Lockout Tagout devices.

Prohibition of Tampering: Emphasizing the severe safety dangers and consequences of restarting or re-energizing equipment that is locked or tagged out.

Who should attend?

Workers who perform Lockout Tagout as a part of their job, or who work in an area where Lockout Tagout servicing is taking place.

ROOT CAUSE ANALYSIS/INJURY INVESTIGATIONS

COURSE DESCRIPTION:

This Root Cause Analysis (RCA) training course will teach participants how to identify the underlying “real” causes of injuries, leading to more effective corrective action and prevention of future injuries. It equips individuals with tools and techniques to do a deep dive, addressing the root causes to achieve lasting improvements.

LEARNING OBJECTIVES:

- Understand the principles and process of Root Cause Analysis.
- Learn various Root Cause Analysis tools and techniques, such as the 5 WHY’s, body diagram, and the importance of fact gathering.
- Develop skills in defining inconsistencies, deficiencies, gathering data, analyzing causes, and implementing corrective actions.
- Understand the importance of Root Cause Analysis in various industries and regulatory environments.

CHILD ABUSE PREVENTION/MANDATED REPORTER

COURSE DESCRIPTION:

California municipalities serve thousands of youth each day through parks, recreation, libraries, camps, and community programs—creating both tremendous opportunity and significant responsibility. This session equips municipal leaders and program administrators with a practical, risk-focused framework for preventing abuse and responding effectively when concerns arise. Participants will gain insight into the true scope of child sexual abuse, how offenders groom and exploit organizational gaps, how to identify red-flag behaviors in adults and youth, and how to address peer-to-peer sexual misconduct before it escalates. The session also clarifies how to manage allegations—including the realities of false reports—while upholding due process, complying with California mandated reporting laws, and protecting public trust.

Participants will leave with:

- A clear understanding of how abuse occurs in municipal settings and how offenders operate
- Practical tools to identify and intervene on red-flag behaviors early
- Strategies to prevent peer-to-peer sexual misconduct through supervision and environmental safeguards
- Guidance on responding to disclosures, documentation, and mandated reporting requirements
- Actionable steps to strengthen policies, training, and organizational culture to reduce risk
